I am pleased to submit the 2001 Agricultural Crop Production Report for Placer County in compliance with Section 2279 of the California Food and Agricultural Code. Also included is the Sustainable Agriculture Report in accordance with Section 2272 of the Code.

The 2000 total gross value was \$68,933,500. The total gross value for 2001 is \$75,036,970, representing an increase of \$6,103,470. This report reflects the gross value of agricultural products and not the net income growers receive.

Rice was the leading industry in 2001 with a gross value of \$13,884,800. This is a decrease of \$1.9 million in gross value over 2000, which was largely due to lower production, partly due to higher water prices, and lower crop prices.

Following rice in total value were: cattle and calf operations at \$13,619,800; timber production at \$13,430,300; nursery products with \$12,853,600; and chickens with a gross value of \$7,130,000.

The Placer County Agricultural Commissioner's Office expresses its appreciation for the cooperation of all the growers, organizations and individuals who provided the information necessary for this report, and to Deputy Agricultural Commissioner Jeffrey C. Pylman, who coordinated and compiled this report.
