<i>Erigeron karvinskianus</i>	Santa Barbara Daisy	perennial
<i>Eriogonum species</i>	Buckwheat	attracts butterflies/birds
<i>Erysimum species</i>	Wallflower	biennial
<i>Eschscholzia californica*</i>	California poppy	
<i>Gaillardia grandiflora</i>	Gaillardia	perennial
<i>Gaura lindheimeri</i>	Wandflower	
<i>Hesperaloe parviflora</i>	Red Yucca	
<i>Iris</i>	Bearded iris	
<i>Lavandula species</i>	Lavender	deer resistant/attracts butterflies
<i>Leonotis leonurus</i>	Lion's tail	attracts hummingbirds
<i>Narcissus</i>	Daffodil	gopher resistant
<i>Nepeta</i>	Catmint	attracts butterflies
<i>Oenothera species</i>	Evening primrose	deer resistant (invasive)
<i>Pennisetum setaceum</i>	Fountain grass	(invasive)
<i>Penstemon species</i>	Beards tongue	
<i>Perovskia atriplicifolia</i>	Russian sage	
<i>Phlomis species</i>		
<i>Ratibida columnifera</i>	Mexican hat	attracts butterflies
<i>Sedum species</i>		
<i>Senecio cineraria</i>	Dusty Miller	extremely drought tolerant
<i>Solidago</i>	Goldenrod	tolerates drought/shade
<i>Stachys</i>	Lamb's ears	deer resistant
<i>Thymus</i>	Thyme	deer resistant/ lawn replacement
<i>Verbena species</i>		attracts butterflies
<i>Watsonia</i>	Bugle Lily	
<i>Zauschneria*</i>	California fuchsia	deer resistant/attracts hummingbirds

<i>Baccharis pilularis</i> *	Coyote brush	extremely drought tolerant
<i>Berberis aquifolium</i> *	Oregon Grape	better in part shade
<i>Bupleurum fruticosum</i>	Shrubby Hare's ear	
<i>Caesalpinia gilliesii</i>	Bird of Paradise Bush	attracts hummingbirds
<i>Carpenteria californica</i> *	Bush anemone	
<i>Caryopteris species</i>	Bluebeard	
<i>Ceanothus species</i> *	California (wild) lilac	
<i>Cistus species</i>	Rockrose	extremely drought tolerant
<i>Convolvulus species</i>	Bush morning glory	
<i>Cotoneaster species</i>		
<i>Dasyliion longissima</i>	Mexican Grass Tree	
<i>Fatsia japonica</i>	Japanese Aralia	
<i>Fremontodendron species</i> *	Flannel bush	
<i>Grevillea rosmarinifolia</i>	Rosemary Grevillea	extremely drought tolerant
<i>Heteromeles arbutifolia</i> *	Toyon/ California holly	
<i>Juniperus species</i>	Junipers	
<i>Leucophyllum frutescens</i>	Texas Ranger	extremely drought tolerant
<i>Myrtus communis</i>	Myrtle	
<i>Nandina domestica</i>	Heavenly bamboo	
<i>Nerium oleander</i>	Oleander	extremely drought tolerant
<i>Osmanthus fragrans</i>	sweet olive	wonderful fragrance in bloom
<i>Plumbago auricciata</i>	Dwarf Plumbago	shrub
<i>Rhaphiolepis indica</i>	Indian Hawthorn	extremely drought tolerant
<i>Rhamnus californica</i> *	Coffeeberry	extremely drought tolerant
<i>Ribes species</i> *	Currants/gooseberries	
<i>Rosmarinus officinalis</i>	Rosemary	extremely drought tolerant
<i>Romneya coulteri</i> *	Matilija poppy	extremely drought tolerant
<i>Salvia species</i> *		attracts hummingbirds
<i>Santolina species</i>		extremely drought tolerant
<i>Xylosma congestum</i>	Xylosma

<i>Aesculus californica*</i>	California buckeye	will drop leaves in July without water
<i>Arbutus unedo</i>	Strawberry Tree	
<i>Arbutus menziesii*</i>	Madrone	
<i>Cercidium species</i>	Palo Verde	
<i>Cercis occidentalis</i>	Western Redbud	
<i>Castanea species</i>	Chestnut	litter/strong odor
<i>Chilopsis linearis</i>	Desert Willow	blooms all summer
<i>Chitalpa tashkentensis</i>	Chitalpa	cross between Catalpa & Chilopsis
<i>Cotinus coggygria</i>	Smoke Bush	
<i>Cupressus arizonica</i>	Arizona cypress	
<i>Cupressus forbesii*</i>	Tecate Cypress	
<i>Elaeagnus angustifolia</i>	Russian Olive	Extremely drought tolerant
<i>Eucalyptus cinerea</i>	Silver Dollar Gum	
<i>Eucalyptus sideroxylon</i>	Pink Iron Bark Eucalyptus	
<i>Eucalyptus viminalis</i>	White Gum Eucalyptus	
<i>Fraxinus dipetala*</i>	Flowering Ash	
<i>Koelreuteria paniculata</i>	Golden Rain Tree	Extremely drought tolerant
<i>Laurus nobilis</i>	Sweet Bay	
<i>Lagerstroemia indica</i>	Crape myrtle	
<i>Olea europaea</i>	Olive	
<i>Pinus canariensis</i>	Canary Island Pine	
<i>Pinus coulteri *</i>	Coulter Pine	
<i>Pinus halepensis</i>	Aleppo Pine	
<i>Pinus monophylla*</i>	Singleleaf Piñon Pine	
<i>Pinus mugo mugo</i>	Mugho Pine	
<i>Pinus roxburghii*</i>	Indian Long Leaf Pine
