ANNUAL FIELD GROWN CUT FLOWERS

Varieties:	There are lots! So the key is to select a few that go well together in a bouquet, have continued bloom after cutting, are easy to grow to get started, and would be a good rotational crop for your other annuals. Sunflowers and/or cosmos would be good to start with.
<u>Sunflowers:</u>	Start with. There are special sunflowers selected for cut flowers that don't shed pollen and these come in a variety of colors and sizes. Some with single stalk & some branch. Succession planting or varieties with different bloom times needed to have continued bloom. Full sun, high fertility, spacing at 9-24". Cut or dried. Johnny's has a great selection: Single Stalk: <u>Procut series</u> – peach, orange, yellow, bicolor, lemon - <u>Sunrich series</u> – orange, lemon, gold <u>Sun series</u> – variations of yellow petals and disks Branching: <u>Ikarus</u> – yellow <u>Strawberry Blond</u> – burgundy-pink w/ yellow tips <u>Autumn Beauty</u> – yellow, bronze, purple, bicolor
<u>Cosmos</u> :	A great cottage garden flower that is easy to grow and will continue to flower all summer if blooms are removed. Full sun, any soil, some wind protection; spacing 9- 12". Johnny's has some special cut flower varieties: <u>Versailles Mix</u> – mix of colors, strong stems <u>Picotee</u> – pink tiped bicolor <u>Sea Shells</u> – mix of colors – fluted edges
<u>Other easy cu</u>	t flower options: Most require average water & soil (the loam would be fine) and succession planting every 2-3 weeks to have continued summer bloom: Agrostemma (Corn Cockle) Ammi (False Queen Anne's Lace) – protect from wind, dry soil ok Centauria (Bachelor's Buttons) – fresh or dry, edible Marigolds – some people don't' like the strong odor (others love it) Nigella (Love-in-a-mist) – Rudbekia (Black-eyed susan) – perennial grown as annual – continuous bloom Salvia Coccinea – perennial grown as annual – continuous bloom Zinnias – should be started indoors and transplanted
Edible flower	<u>s</u> : All these would do well in average garden soil (loam) with average water. The petals are quite perishable so would best be packed in clamshells and refrigerated. Borage Nasturtium – jewel mix Marigold – lemon gem Calendula – déjà vu Anise hyssop
