Our Mission & Goals

he University of California Cooperative Extension in Marin is part of a statewide ■ system that makes UC research based information available to local agencies, industries and the public. Cooperative Extension's mission is to serve California through the creation, development and application of knowledge in agricultural, natural and human resources.



Academic staff are at the forefront of change. Goals include working to preserve agriculture, protecting our environment, helping communities shape wise public policy, and strengthening community development and leadership skills in our youth and adults. In Marin County we are also known as the Farm Advisor's office.

Our programs operate through a unique partnership between county government, the UC system, support from the USDA, and other private funds. Backed by the resources

of the UC campuses, our educational programs use practically applied research information to solve community problems. We consult with individuals and organizations, publish newsletters, conduct local applied research, produce information for mass media, and conduct seminars and workshops.

Serving both Marin and Sonoma counties, the livestock, marine, range, and dairy science programs work with producers, industry representatives, resource agencies, and other interested groups addressing the following topics:

Agriculture and Natural Resources with a special focus on:

- promoting and diversifying Marin agriculture
- some environmental protection
- water quality in Marin watersheds
- so animal health & welfare

Urban Horticulture with a special focus on:

- providing Integrated Pest Management information to landscape industry

Master Gardeners focus on the least toxic approaches to solving horticultural problems and stress reduction of plant waste through composting and conservation of water through appropriate plant selection.

4-H reached over 4,000 people through organized clubs and groups, collaborative events and fairs. 295 adult volunteer leaders donated 23,360 hours of service. Almost 1,000 more youth in schools and youth centers participated in special interest projects in embryology, environmental education, and gardening.

Organic & Sustainable Agriculture Program

The project is designed to strengthen the viability and long-term success of Marin agriculture by assisting farmers and ranchers with diversification. The "Grown in Marin" program has several components including ongoing speaker series on crop and farm diversification, a monthly newsletter with information about new and profitable marketing opportunities, field trials assistance and the production of a web-based directory connecting farmers to consumers.




Sudden Oak Death (SOD) Regional Coordination

Funding: California Department of Forestry; California Oak Mortality Task Force

Duration: 2001-2003

Staff ecologist Janice Alexander provides regional and county coordination on Sudden Oak Death in close cooperation with the California Oak Mortality Task Force. Last fiscal year over 2,000 Marin residents were provided information about SOD. Janice maintains a database on current research efforts, and provides education materials and assistance to other infected counties.



Bay Area Gardening, Practical Essays by Marin Master Gardeners

This book contains 66 concise, informative pieces on a wide range of gardening topics, all written by Marin County Master Gardeners. Originally written for a weekly column in the *Marin Independent Journal*, each topic in this volume reflects basic philosophies such as non-toxic solutions to common pest problems, wise use of natural resources and reliance on a balanced ecology to create healthy, sustainable gardens. Proceeds from the sale of the book go towards supporting community service projects in Marin.



Food Stamp Nutrition Education Program

Marin County 4-H is participating in the Youth Food Stamp Nutrition Education Program (FSNEP) through USDA and the California Department of Social Services. This program promotes a healthy lifestyle for youth and their families who receive food stamps. Staff work with school programs to offer nutrition education. At the completion of the federal year, FSNEP had served 708 youth members, 75% of whom were under age 5 and 70% represented minority groups.



Marin Master Gardener IPM & School Garden Outreach Project

Funding: Marin County Stormwater Pollution Prevention Program (MCSTOPPP)

Duration: 1999-2003

Julie Carter and Cathy Sinclair coordinated the Public IPM and School Garden programs funded by MCSTOPPP. Over 21 schools received consulting on how to start, maintain and integrate their garden into the school curriculum. Information and materials on least toxic alternatives to household and garden pests were provided to almost 2,000 Marin residents at various workshops and special events held throughout the county.

Nutrient Budgeting for Dairies

More stringent water quality regulations for dairy and other animal operations may have serious impacts for dairy operators. A workshop on budgeting dairy nutrients for maximum use in field fertilization applications was conducted for Marin and Sonoma dairy producers. Quarantine Compliance for Sudden Oak Death (SOD)

Daylong training was provided to 147 arborists and landscapers in June on sampling, recognition, and quarantine compliance for Sudden Oak Death. The course fulfilled California Department of Food & Agriculture requirement that arborists and landscapers be certified as non-regulatory SOD samplers.

Native Oyster Restoration

Oyster shell bags and native olympia oysters are being outplanted in Tomales Bay as part of a multi-year research project to restore oyster populations and improve the overall ecology of Bay plant and animal communities. Research has demonstrated an increase in the diversity and abundance of fish and invertebrates, and enhanced native oyster populations by providing good substrate for larvae to settle.



Agricultural Conservation Easement Survey

Forty-six agricultural landowners from Marin, Sonoma and Yolo counties who had sold conservation easements were interviewed to assess their satisfaction with their easements. The landowners in most cases were enthusiastic sellers. Their motivations included cash, keeping the land in the family and conservation. They reported generally satisfactory experiences with the easement program.

Copper Sulfate Effectiveness for SOD Prevention

Trials are underway, in cooperation with Dr. Matteo Garbelotto and other cooperators, for a preventative treatment for Sudden Oak Death. The trial looks at the effectiveness of preventing *P. ramorum* infection on mature coast live oaks with a copper sulfate spray. The field trials have been in place for the past year and are continuing this year at Miwok Park in Novato.

Phosphonate Effectiveness for SOD Prevention

With funding from USDA Forest Service, trials are underway to determine the effectiveness of phosphonate injections on 30 *P. ramorum* infected trees as a preventative. The team is monitoring each tree's health.
