It seems like food safety is in the news daily. What information does UC Cooperative Extension have to help me with some of my questions?

You are absolutely right, food safety is a topic that is in the news a lot these days. And it is important for all of us to be informed about it too. UC Cooperative Extension has a number of resources to help you with your questions.

First, it is important to understand that food safety can be thought about in a number of ways, and depends on your perspective. For example if you are farming, food safety will include thinking about, and having the most up-to-date information for, your on-farm agricultural practices and operations. If you are a consumer, you will want to be informed about safe food purchases, storage, and preparation. If you are an educator, you will want to have information that is appropriate for the groups you are working with, for example, children or adults.

The US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and the World Health Organization (WHO) have identified several priorities with respect to food safety, which illustrate the difference perspectives that make up this broad topic. The priorities are:

- 1. Microbiological contamination
- 2. Nutritional imbalance
- 3. Environmental contamination
- 4. Naturally occurring toxins
- 5. Pesticide residues
- 6. Food additives

For farmers, our local contact for food safety questions is Steve Koike, UC Cooperative Extension Plant Pathology Farm Advisor.
